Joellenne – Middle Section. The meaning of my section of the mural was about World War Two. I was proud to draw the Victorian Cross, Ladies Auxiliary, ships from the navy and a poppy. I hope you see the meaning of our lost soldiers with the saying I placed on the mural. “Honour the dead and help the living.” I honored my great grandfather who served in the war by putting his name on the dog tags.

Matt – Third Section. The meaning of the things I put in my section were based on the Canadian peacekeepers currently stationed in Afghanistan. Also, to symbolize the good work they are doing over there. ON GOING EVENTS 2006 - 2016
